

On June 25, 1989, the United States Postal Service (USPS) became the first federal agency to officially acknowledge "Pride Day" and the twentieth anniversary of Stonewall Uprising by authorizing a pictorial cancellation. The postmark was a resounding success notwithstanding Senator Jesse Helms attempt to prevent the event.

It all begin when the Gay & Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation, Inc. (GLAAD) read the coverage of our club in the national Advocate magazine (Issue 500 - 6/7/88). Ironically, none of GLAAD staff are philatelists!

While seeking the approval of USPS, GLAAD also enlisted the help of our club. We met to discuss methods of making this project appealing to stamp

collectors -- covers, maxicards, postcards, etc.

Paul Hennefeld, winner of several national and gold awards for his extraordinary collection "Alternate Lifestyles of Famous People" (an exhibit which documents historical figures on various forms of philatelic material), our president Ed S Centeno and other officials of GLHSC, were most helpful to GLAAD both from a philatelically and historical ly standpoint. The cancellation was finally approved on June 8th (to late for adequate coverage on major stamp newspapers).

GLAAD proceeded with original plans of issuing 5,000 souvenir postcards with space for postage and postmark on front. We (GLHSC) decided to, independently issue cachets using the cover page from Paul's collection.

The design features the Heritage of Pride logo designed by Keith Haring an international renowned (gay) pop artist. Mr. Haring is no stranger to philatelists. In 1984 the World Federation of United Nations Associations (WFUNA) commissioned him to design a cachet and lithograph for the International Youth Year' first day of issue. His second design for WFUNA was for the International Volunteer Day' first day of issue.

During "Pride Day" Parade and street fair, one could feel the excitement in the air!! Lines for the cancellation were extremely long and

post office employees worked tirelessly until 5:00 P.M.

People were mailing letters and postcards to friends, relatives and loved ones from the mobile post office located at Sheridan Square. GLAAD sold out it's entire run of special postcards and estimated that over 25,000 cancellations had been applied!! USPS more conservatively estimated about 15,000 cancellations, nevertheless a very high volume for one day.

The USPS stated that for other street fairs and special events in New

York City, less than 3-4,000 cancels were the norm.

Our club also took part of the festivities by having a booth at the street fair. Ken, Ed's life companion, constructed a sturdy and most impres sive booth for our club (it sure pays having a handy man around the house).

The idea was so successful that we are making it a yearly ritual and

possibly having a float.

Thankfully, Ken constructed a roof to shield us from the sun. The booth accommodated four people comfortably with chairs and cooler, and plenty of counter space to display various philatelic material. We passed out copies of Linn's News and Stamp, club literature, promotional material encouraging people into philately. I must say, the view from the booth was quite enticing - the day was hot and most people were wearing the most minimal attire...

We were really surprised at the number of people who collected stamps, but were "unaware" of organized philately. Most of the people that stopped by our booth (1,020) were only interested in purchasing the cachet for friends and for its political and historical significance. We sold out all 800 prepared covers and we took orders for many people that missed out!!

STONEWALL, which occurred twenty years ago, was the openning salvo in the fight for gay liberation. On that Friday, June 27, police officers and detectives descended on a gay owned establiment called "Stonewall Inn" in Greenwich Village and prepared to arrest patrons without ID's. Such raids were routine enough, but the atmosphere that night was filled with outrage.

"You'll need a tank to beat me," Martina said once to a Russian opponent. As of July 1989, her total gross earnings were more than \$13MM, more than any player in the history of tennis. She couldn't achieve this success in Communist controlled Czech.

At the age of six she fell in love with tennis. Her stepfather patient ly coached her. And up to this date she credits him for his guidance and

encouragement.

Her parents sacrificed summer vacations to save money so she could travel to tournaments. But she yearned to go abroad, especially to the United States: "I was so stubborn, so independent, that I was more American than Czech, even as a little kid."

The ticket out was her athletic stills. Navratilova's first trip beyond Czech borders was in 1969 to West Germany, where she did well in a tournament. "My first trip out confirmed my suspicions that the West had a

style and a freedom that Communism couldn't match," she wrote.

She continued her tennis practice, improving her tennis games, at the Sparta Club in Prague while attending school. She played again in West Germany, England, and in Soviet block countries (including Soviet Union). At the age of fifteen, she won the Czech National Championships.

In 1973, Martina made her first visit to America. After playing in tennis tournaments in Florida and Dallas, she was ready to compete with America's finest women players. In Akron, Ohio she faced Chris Evert for the first time, starting their famous rivalry.

Martina and Chris victories on this tour qualified her for the Wimble-

don Tournament in England, which she eventually won in 1978.

In August 1975, while playing in Westchester County, New York, she defected with her agents's help. The loneliness resulting from this decision hit her like a "ton of bricks," she wrote in her candid 1985 autobiography. She could have returned at any time for visits if she had been married to a U. S. citizen, but by now she accepted the fact that she was a lesbian.

She fell in love with an older woman who ended the relationship after

six months. The romance was kept discreet from the press.

This became apparent when she had a relationship with novelist Rita Mae Brown. They met in 1978 in Virginia when Brown asked to be introduced to her while researching a Czech character for a book. They met again in 1979.

Navratilova found Brown intellectually stimulating. Martina wrote "I liked Brown's seething, witty core." But Brown had no interest in tennis, which ruptured the relationship. She left Brown, after a loud scene in 1981 on the advice of basketball player Nancy Lieberman.

Nancy became dominating and in 1984 Martina broke up the relationship. Martina writes, "my next love was a wife and mother whose marriage was

already in trouble."

She became a U.S. citizen in 1981, and she praises America for giving her "the space and freedom" to be a champion. But when told "society" isn't ready yet for the freedom to be gay, she replied, "aren't we part of society too? I don't like labels. Just call me Martina

"AIDS ON STAMPS" UPDATE:

Jean Anne Hlavacek, a nurse at University Hospital and Clinics in Madison, Wisconsin, was rejected by the Citizens's Stamp Advisory Committee (for the eighth times over the past two year) for a postage stamp designed to advertise the AIDS problem. Their reason: "People don't want dissagreeable or gloomy stamps on their mail."

Her campaign began in August 1987 after her best friend's father-inlaw died of AIDS. She has spend more than \$3,000 of her own money and vacation time sending letters to government offficals and soliciting thousands of signatures for petions in support of the stamp.

In response, she has received numeral letters of endorsement from government officials and orgazinations, including a leeter of support from President George Bush when he was Vice President.

ANDY WARHOL ON A STAMP?? (1930 - 1987)

The Andy Warhol Diaries published by Warner Books in May 1989 reveals his gay inclinations. The book mentions him wanting a gay relationship with a younger man. The book also details close friends (Truman Capote, Tennesse Williams, etc.). What's hard to believe is his claim of never having any sexual contact with anyone.

Andy Warhol was world's most prominent Pop artist, famous for his repeated silk-screen images of everyday subjects from Campbell's soup cans to celebrities. He's also known for his underground "adult films" (Trash, Chelsea Girls). In 1985 Andy turned down the United States Postal Service for a commission.


Fred Hughes (executor of Warhol's estate) came across what appears to be the first <u>cinderella</u> commemorating this American artist. Andy, son of an immigrant Czech coal miner and a homemaker, died on February 22, 1987 at age 58. He suffered a fetal heart attack after gall bladder surgery. The label depicts the artist's 1966 Self-Portrait.


For months a French artist named Michel Hosszu have been mailing letters with only these beautiful labels for postage. The stamp has no nation nor price (this concept is called "Phantom Philately). So far, says Hosszu, the stamps have carried 900 envelopes though 30 postal systems around the world.

He spent thousands of dollars in producing a limited edition of 2,500 stamps. "I chose a typeface and a set of colors that Warhol might have chosen," he says. " I made the stamps without price or country so they could be mailed from anywhere." It was crazy - the post office helping my homage.

Mailing letters with any unauthorized postage is illegal, but postal services from Tahiti to Kuwait have honored these. "Postmen around the world are participating," says Hosszu, who has sent the stamps to those who might be interested. He has put 140 stamps though the New York postal system, and on the anniversary of Warhol's death, he'll stop

"People have been mailing Cinderella stamps for years." says Peter Robertson, curator of the Philatelic Foundation. "If the post office delivers it, that doesn't make it a postage stamp." *





"In the future, everyone will be world famous for 15 minutes" Cinderella is any stamp-like item other than government issued postage stamps or postal stationery. Many collectors (especially topicalist) include them as sideline to their philatelic endeavors. Although fun to collect, they don't belong on exhibit pages.

Most frequent, cinderella are found on back of envelopes, usually across the flap to aid in sealing the envelope.



I participated in the Stonewall Uprising (the Boston Tea Party of the Gay Rights Movement), an experience I will never forget. This was an assertion of independence and freedom from the oppression and discrimination suffered by gay Americans from the likes of Senator Helms.

We have come a long way since then. The American Topical Association, of which I am a proud member of, has recognized our club as an official study unit. Your publication [Linn's] along with STAMPS Magazine has been certain ly generous with coverage of our quarterly journal throughout the years.

I am glad the USPS is sensitive to the progress made in this area. Twenty years from now, if not sooner, there will be U.S. stamps honoring gay history just as we now honor black history. By then, Senator Helms will be a fly speck in history.
